A licensee or permit holder must not share information about a person with staff at other premises (Personal Information Protection Act 2004).

Being barred from a licensed or permit premises

Section 81 of the *Liquor Licensing Act 1990*

A person may be prohibited from **entering** or **remaining** on a licensed or permit premises. Staff at the premises may bar a person for:

- being intoxicated; or
- being violent or quarrelsome; or
- putting their safety or the safety of others on the premises at risk because of their consumption of liquor, or

on any other reasonable ground.

If you are served with a barring order while on the premises you must:



immediately leave the premises and vicinity (50 metres)



not re-enter or remain in the vicinity for six hours or until the premises is closed for the day, whichever is longer (you may re-enter the vicinity after this time)



not re-enter or remain in the premises while the Order is in place

A barred person may only enter or remain in the vicinity (ie 50 metres from the entry and exit) immediately after they are barred if they have a reasonable excuse, such as:

- living within the vicinity
- catching transport
- fearing for their safety if they leave the vicinity

The penalty for not complying with a barring order is a fine of up to 50 penalty units (\$7 850 for 2016–17).

This page is to be provided to the barred person.

Part D - Proof of Service

This Order does not operate until it is served on the person to be barred, by either:

- ***giving it to the person; or***
- ***sending it by post to that person's last known place of residence; or***
- ***leaving it at that person's last known place of residence.***

A copy of this order must be kept at the licensed or permit premises.

When barring a person tell them that:

1. They are required by law to leave the premises and the vicinity (50 metres from the entry and exit).
2. They must not re-enter or remain in the vicinity until the premises is closed for the day or for six hours, whichever is longer (they may re-enter the vicinity after this time).
3. They must not re-enter or remain in the premises while the Order is in place.
4. It is an offence not to comply with the Barring Order and there are penalties.
